Although many careers in the field of Psychology will require you to spend a few more years in higher education, there are a plethora of careers related to Psychology that can be had by those holding only a Bachelor's in Psychology. Here are some of the more common positions available: Career advisor, counselor, detective, human resources officer, life coach, and market researcher. Some of these pay exceptionally well, even better than the pay one would receive from a career within the field of Psychology. Yes, that's right, I brought up that dirty thing we don't like to talk about - MONEY. It is something we have to focus on though, especially with the economic issue our generation has to face.

Recently, the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the US Census Bureau, and the University of Minnesota along with Bankrate.com collected data from 15,000 bachelor degree recipients and found that on average, for those with careers within the field of Psychology, overall pay was low and graduate degree requirements were high. Meaning if you are not fully emotionally invested in the field and certain that this is what you want to do for the rest of your life, you may end up feeling like you got a poor return on your investment after getting your bachelor's degree and going to grad school.

However, there is hope; there are many paths one can take to find a fulfilling career. If you're unsure, make sure to reach out to counselors at your university, professors, friends, and peer mentors, whether you're feeling overwhelmed, in need of advice, or just want to rant a little too, we are here to help.

Internship Information

If you are an undergrad Psychology major at CSUF, you will be required to take the 495-internship class. The requirements for taking an internship course are:

- Completion of three upper-level courses in psychology at CSUF
- A 2.0 GPA
- Internship site must use psychological theories or methods
- 120 hours of experience at the site

Potential internship sites include schools, counseling offices, hospitals, clinics, social service programs, oncampus research labs, and much more. The CSUF psychology department website keeps an updated list of sites as well as current research labs where other students have successfully completed their internship hours.


